Craig Howe (Oglala Lakota) earned his Ph.D. in architecture and anthropology from the University of Michigan and is a member of the Graduate Studies faculty at Oglala Lakota College. He served as deputy assistant director for cultural resources at the National Museum of the American Indian, Smithsonian Institution, and as director of the D’Arcy McNickle Center for American Indian History at the Newberry Library. He has developed innovative tribal histories projects and museum exhibitions, taught Native studies courses in the United States and Canada, and authored numerous articles.
